An Autumn Prayer and Blessing


In the fading of the summer sun, the shortening of days, cooling breeze, swallows' flight and moonlight rays

Cruden Parish Church

Dear Friends,

At the time of writing, we are enjoying the final part of summer with Autumn just around the corner. The changing of the seasons is marked with the shortening of the days and the gathering of swallows for their annual migration. Here I am fortunate. The kitchen window of the Manse looks straight onto the back of Port Erroll School. Along with the pesky Herring Gulls, we get a grandstand view of Swallows, House Martins and Swifts performing ariel acrobatics as they feast on the local insect population.

The migration of these birds is an amazing feat of nature. The Swallows will head south, flying down western France and eastern Spain before crossing into Morocco, traversing the Sabara Desert, Congo Rain Forest, before reaching their winter home in Namibia and South Africa. Travelling somewhere between 17 and 22 miles per hour they cover an average of 200 miles per day and take six weeks to complete their journey. It is thought they navigate using the Earth's magnetic field, and visual landmarks. Should they survive the arduous navigation, a swallow can expect to live to up 16 years.

Whilst Swallows mark the welcome arrival and reluctant departure of summer, they also have symbolic meaning. There is an apocryphal (ie not found in the Bible) story of the young Jesus making birds of clay and bringing them to life as swallows. Whilst this story has no historical basis, Swallows do make several appearances in the Bible. They are mentioned in the book of Psalms as a symbol of peace and divine protection. In some Biblical stories, swallows are seen as a sign of hope. In Isaiah 38:14, King Hezekiah speaks of his illness as if it were a Swallow that has come to his house with the hope of healing.

My favourite reference to Swallows appears in one of the most majestic of psalms.

How lovely is your dwelling place,
LORD Almighty!
My soul yearns, even faints,
for the courts of the LORD;
my heart and my flesh cry out
for the living God.
Even the sparrow has found a home,
and the swallow a nest for herself,
where she may have her young—
a place near your altar,
LORD Almighty, my King and my God.
Blessed are those who dwell in your house;
they are ever praising you. (Psalm 84:1-4)

The Psalm here speaks of a deep yearning to be in the place of God's presence and dwelling. As the Swallows (not forgetting the Sparrows!) find a place to nest and rear their young within the temple building, so the writer of the Psalm longs to find a place in Gods house.

As I reflect on these words, two thoughts come to mind. Personal faith finds its natural home in God's house and among God's people. This means attending church in person is one of the most basic expressions of faith and the one of the promises of church membership. There is a question here worthy of reflection. For what do you yearn? Is it time to reconsider the place of Jesus in your life?

And my final thought. As I look out from the kitchen window and watch the Swallows, House Martins and (occasional) Swift dive and weave as they consume the local population of midges before they gather and leave on their long perilous journey to warmer climes, may they soon return.

Wishing you all a colourful autumn!

Back in June we celebrated the first birthday of The Community Larder. Visitors included the Moderator of Presbytery – the Rev Stella Campbell, Sam Leys - Business Development Manager of Cfine and local Councillors, George Hall and Colin Simpson (not forgetting our hard working volunteers and representatives of Cruden Bay Community Association.)

The Larder is open each Friday from 10.30 am to 12.00 noon. Based in the Pavilion in Mill Park in Cruden Bay, there is the opportunity to enjoy tea and coffee and obtain a variety of foodstuffs (donated by supermarkets and businesses) which were surplus to requirement.

The Community Larder is not a Food Bank. However, it does offer a local opportunity to share surplus food stuffs (ie the collection of tins and dried goods that are lurking at the back of all our kitchen cupboards!) We also have access to a fridge and freezer and can accept fresh and frozen items that are still in the use by date. This also includes home grown fruit and vegetables.

PRESBYTERY UPDATE

Not too much to report as the Presbytery does not meet during the summer. There are a few items that may be of interest.

Our new Moderator is the Rev Shuna Dicks. Shuna is Minister of Cults Parish Church, a fellow Chaplain within the Army Cadet Force and plays the trumpet with the Aberdeen Concert Band. I have known Shuna for several years and was delighted when her appointment as Moderator was announced.

The previous Moderator was the Rev Stella Campbell of Skene Parish Church. (I have known Stella even longer than Shuna!) . Stella did such a wonderful job in chairing Presbytery meetings through a time of great uncertainty and change. Stella has since been appointed Presbytery Clerk. Both Shuna and Stella bring a significant amount of experience and competence to the new Presbytery. Whether they will cope, understand and appreciate my sense of humour in another matter....

Further appointments to Presbytery Staffing include Rev Dr Robert Smith as Mission Officer and Daria Oskolkova as Communications Office. They join with our own James Buckingham-Hyman who was the first appointee as Administration Officer.

On the 1st of June I became the Interim Moderator to Fraserburgh and District Parish Church. This new grouping is a union of seven existing congregations into one new united congregation. Three church buildings remain in use with four now closed. These figures give some idea of painful adjustment that hae taken place. My role as Interim Moderator will focus on guiding the new Kirk Session thought the process of calling a new ministry team. This will occasionally mean my absence from Cruden Parish Church.

Also, within Presbytery I am a member of the TADMAM Committee. This rather odd sounding title is Training and Development for Ministry and Mission. I am involved with the missional aspect of Committees work. Like much of the activity of the new Presbytery, this is a work in progress!"

GIFT AID

Gift Aid is a government scheme which allows the congregation of Cruden Parish Church, as a registered charity, to reclaim the tax you have already paid on the money you give in your offering. Giving your offering as a Gift Aid contribution increases the value of your offering by 25%. For example £20 becomes £25, £40 becomes £50, £100 becomes £125 etc, and is at no extra cost to the givers or to the congregation.

Anyone who pays Income Tax or Capital Gains Tax can Gift Aid their offerings provided they have paid the same amount or more in tax in that tax year. To give your offering as a Gift Aid contribution you are required to complete and sign a Gift Aid declaration form which you can get from the Gift Aid Convener – Maureen Esson, Tel: 01779 813049, Mob: 07949 792233. You are not required to give a particular amount or to give for a specified period of time and you can cancel your Gift Aid declaration at any time by writing to the Gift Aid Convener. You must also advise the Convener if you stop paying sufficient tax or change your name or address.

As good stewards, we are called to make the best use of the resources we have been given and the tax recovered on Gift Aid offerings helps Cruden Parish Church to continue to support our mission work in the community.
