

Dear Friends

What is your favourite birthday memory? Is it a special event like a party, when you were joined by friends and family? Or was it a special gift - maybe an unexpected present which you enjoyed and appreciated?

I have two birthday memories. My fortieth birthday was spent in a tent in the Lake District. I was on an adventure training expedition with a group of Army Cadets. It was memorable for three reasons. My tent pole snapped in half and was repaired using a stick with copious amounts of insulating tape. The weather was dry and sunny (a wee bit unusual for that part of the world). And on the evening of my birthday, Alison celebrated by being taken out for dinner at a posh hotel – in my absence!

The second birthday memory occurred on my fiftieth. Again, Alison was absent, but this time with good reason. A group of friends had clubbed together and treated me to the experience of driving a steam engine. It was an amazing experience, being at the controls of a fully restored Standard Class 9F 2-10-0 steam locomotive. The engine was originally designed to pull freight trains of up to 900 tons. Whilst our speed was limited to 30 mph, you had a real sense of the power available. Probably the best birthday present I could have imagined. It came as a complete surprise.

Birthdays were the theme of a recent church service. On Sunday 8th June 2025 we celebrated the day of Pentecost, when through wind and flame and the gift of languages, the Holy Spirit was given, and Christian Church was born. The occasion also included a cake that was shared at the end of the service. The cake also had a message – Happy 249th Birthday. Obviously, the Christian Church is around two thousand years old, with the Pentecost taking place during the Jewish festival of Shavuot. So why happy 249th birthday?

The number on the cake (249) referred to the age of the current Church building. Whilst the origins of the church date back to somewhere around 1012, the first (or second?) church was located close to the present-day Fairway Public House, with a new church built on the current site possibly before the Scottish Reformation of 1560. This building was then replaced by the current church in 1776, which was enlarged in 1834. Hope you got all that! This means our current building will be 250 years old next year.

Here is the question, I would like you all to consider - how should we celebrate our 250th birthday? What sort of activities should we plan? There has already been a suggestion of a flower festival. My thinking to date, is that we should not just have one event, but a series of events over the year. Also, whist it is good to look back and celebrate the past, what about the future? What can we do to

further improve or adapt the building? And what can we do to promote the mission and renewal of the church?

During the summer months, I would like to invite you to consider appropriate and interesting ways of celebrating this special birthday. Please pass on any suggestions to me or Robert Esson for the consideration of the Kirk Session.

We also have access to a fridge and freezer and can accept fresh and frozen items that are still in the 'best before' date. This also includes home grown fruit and vegetables.

The project, which is being run by volunteers from Cruden Parish Church in partnership with the Cruden Bay Community Association and Cfine.

Aberdeen's new Port Chaplain

was pleased to be able to forward some warm jackets donated by a member of the congregation and a collection of knitted hats provided by the ladies of the craft group.

Iain offers pastoral support to the seafaring community, many of whom are from overseas. Alongside his pastoral work, Iain collects and distributes warm clothing. He writes, 'Many people from warmer countries come unprepared for Scottish weather, so I am always in need of hats, scarves, neck warmers and mittens. Spare jackets and jumpers are appreciated too.

The Presbytery Communications Officer, Daria Oskolkova, writes about Iain's work:

Imagine yourself on a ship in the North Sea, somewhere between Aberdeen and Bergen. You're caught up in a fierce storm: the wind is howling, and the waves tower above. The crew is on edge, but you are utterly frightened – this is your first job at sea. You're shivering and can't seem to get warm, as you are used to much warmer climates. And it's Christmas. But then a small gift bag reminds you that someone thought of you. Inside are a few necessities, a warm hat and a bag of sweets. And as you're having a hot cup of tea with a piece of chocolate, your day brightens – thanks to Iain Sanders, Aberdeen's new port chaplain.

FITNESS at CRUDEN

Just sharing a few words and thoughts on the fitness group run here locally by Sean. The group has been going for approximately three years now and from the start has been attended regularly by a committed group of men and women of varying ages and abilities.

We meet at Longhaven Hall every Wednesday from 6pm to 7pm. We meet indoors during the winter months but can hopefully be a mix of indoor/outdoor during the summer. The class consists of a mixture of cardiovascular training ie circuits and non-contact boxercise, using pads and gloves. The class usually winds down with some yoga. All equipment is provided, all you need to take along is your body and a water bottle.

The first session Sean offers free as an introduction and it's £5 thereafter.

It's a non-profit class that Sean has established, with all monies raised going towards hall hire and/or any new equipment needed. Sean is a fully qualified and insured fitness instructor

On a personal note I am 62 years of age and thought I was getting a bit long in the tooth to join a fitness group. However, this group has been something of a godsend for me and has greatly helped with some minor health issues and my general well-being.

Sean has been an inspiring instructor (and no, he hasn't paid me to say this). This is a class with no pressure, no judgement, along with a lot of mutual support and camaraderie. Things are well structured with a good variety of exercises, and I especially enjoy the boxing training but if this wasn't something that appealed to you that's not a problem, as other forms of exercise run alongside.

I think I can safely speak for everyone who goes along to this group, that we look forward to the class and would highly recommend to anyone thinking of improving their fitness to come along and give it a go.

Nothing ventured, nothing gained, as they say!

THE HIDDEN CRISIS

We live in a world where there seems to be endless crisis, some are on our TV screens almost daily and others we hear little or nothing about

The World Health Organisation Malaria Report 2024 says that:

There were 2,907,000 estimated malaria cases in South Sudan in 2023 246 million estimated malaria cases in the WHO Africa region in 2023 Of the estimated 569,000 malaria deaths in the WHO Africa region in 2023, 76% were children under the age of 5.

A child under 5 dies every 73 seconds.

In South Sudan malaria cases peak during the rainy season which is in June and July when mosquitos are most prevalent, leading to extra strain on the very limited medical resources.

Mission Aviation Fellowship is supporting Noah's Place Mission Hospital which is located in Tonj, South Sudan by flying in staff and medical supplies on a regular basis. With limited resources the hospital sees over 60,000 patients per year and it is estimated that two thirds of them are suffering from malaria.

The hospital also carries out medical outreaches to 140 isolated villages in the region, greatly increasing the workload.

Malaria is an easily curable disease provided people get access to the medication and many mothers spend hours, if not days, walking to the hospital seeking help for their sick youngsters. Sadly it can be too late for far too many.
