Dear Friends,

Back in April I enjoyed a memorable weekend away in London which included running the marathon. What makes the London Marathon so remarkable is the level of support and cheering. It is hard to put this into perspective. I have run marathons in Europe and the Middle East, but nothing compares with the incredible atmosphere generated by the crowds in London. It is as if the whole city resonated with positivity. (In 2025 there were around 57,000 participants and a supporting crowd estimated to be around 750,000!) It is no wonder that over a million people (including me) unsuccessfully applied for a place in next year's event.

At the time of writing, London was again in the news. Again, a large crowd of people had gathered around a common cause. But it was not to celebrate athletic achievement. It was to protest the high levels of illegal immigration. On Saturday 13th September, a crowd estimated to be between 100,000 and 150,000 marched through central London under the banner of 'Unite the Kingdom'. Carrying placards and banners which proclaimed 'Stop the boats' the crowd was generally good natured. By the afternoon the atmosphere turned hostile. Isolated violent scuffles broke out which saw twenty-five police officers injured, four seriously.

There is much that can be said here about illegal migration. There is a growing level of public disquiet. Successive governments appear to have failed to adequately address the issue. Perhaps the biggest concern is the mischievous personalities who are feeding off and manipulating the public's concern and frustration. One of the leading figures of the protest movement goes by the name of Tommy Robinson. His criminal record includes convictions for violence, financial, and immigration frauds, cocaine possession with intent to supply, and public order offences.

This is also a local issue. There have been protests outside migrant hotels in Westhill and Aberdeen, which have led to arrests. A few weeks ago, a Facebook post reported the arrival of a group at the former RAF base in Boddam. The arrival of the individuals under cover of darkness sparked local gossip and concerned about illegal migrants. As usual the truth of the matter was a little more mundane. It was a group of Cadets from down south who arrived for their annual camp!

It is not possible in a pastoral letter to fully explore what is a complicated issue. But migration should concern us all. We should have a heartfelt and prayerful concern for the security and wellbeing of all genuine seekers of asylum. Many refugees come from places like Iran and Afghanistan. We can hardly imagine the repression and brutality they have suffered. In response, the Bible calls us repeatedly to welcome, love and care for the stranger, the foreigner and the sojourner. (Exodus 22, Leviticus 19, Leviticus 24, Deuteronomy 6, Deuteronomy 10, Psalm 105)

And there is a deeper concern here. Whose voice should be shaping public opinion? Is it people like Tommy Robinson, Ellon Musk or the French far -right politician Eric Zemmour. Or should the church be shouting from the rooftops about the worth and dignity of those forced to flee from their homes? Of this I am certain. The need has never been greater for the voice of God's people to be heard.

Wishing you a joyful and colourful Autumn.

The Fellowship Group meets fortnightly on Monday evenings from 7.00 pm to 8.30pm.


The group provides an opportunity to explore faith related issues, Bible Study and prayer. Everybody welcome.

'Maasai girls are sold to an old man for cattle exchange. They have no choice so they become his property and can't make any decisions for themselves.' – 14 year old Elinami

1 in 3 young girls, like Elinami, are married before they turn 18.

In Indepesi, Tanzania, young girls have their education, future, and basic human rights traded away for a few cows. Their voices aren't heard; their hopes are shattered.

'Many Maasai girls my age are married, and some have children too.' – Elinami

Child marriage is, unfortunately, a common occurrence for the Maasai in remote Tanzania. It greatly increases the risk of violence, abuse, ill health, and early death for young girls.

Girls as young as 11 can be married off, becoming the man's property. For Elinami, school is protection. It's the reason she can dream of a life she wants, and not one that's forced on her.

'I'm grateful that I can go to school. School can save me and give me a better life.'

MAF has partnered with Help For The Maasai (HFTM) – an organisation that runs the primary school, secondary school, medical centre, and orphanage in the remote area of Malambo, Tanzania – to deliver school supplies and medical check-up kits for every child.


MAF flights are the only way to get these essential supplies to them quickly and safely.

When the students at Naserian English Medium Primary School and Naserian Secondary School go home at the end of the semester, many will deteriorate rapidly in health due to homes not having the supplies, food, and clean water that the schools have.

That's why the back-to-school medical check-ups run by HFTM are so important.

These check-ups can include malaria tests, minor medical treatments (burns, small wounds, or skin diseases), short term treatments (worms, UTI, or infections), a supply of vitamins, and extra nutritious food for eight weeks.
